Introductions

We welcomed back Dr. Brittany Campbell from NPMA. Brittany was a guest at our last meeting, and we hope she can join the committee on a regular basis. We also welcomed Courtney Frazier, a guest from the Florida Department of Agriculture and Consumer Services and likewise hope that she will continue to attend.

Old Business

After introductions Mary Begin (Chair) shared that ASPCRO has a Pest Management in Schools Committee that developed an Antimicrobial Advisory Document, and that the committee may want to table any further discussion of educating the public on Antimicrobials to avoid duplication of efforts.

The Committee reflected on those topics that have been highlighted during past meetings

- Education available to the committee and the public on Antimicrobials with a focus on schools and childcare facilities.
- Illegal pesticides found on the shelf during marketplace inspections and how we can
 educate the public. Focus on educating store managers on how to read the label and
 identify any discrepancies that could point to a possibility that the product is not
 registered for use.
- Timely legitimate materials to enable the States to share information within their own Agencies but also the public.
- Consistency among the states when evaluating 25b products for public health pests and required information for efficacy review.

New Business

Some members of the Committee expressed concern regarding the clarity of the PHC's goals and where the focus of attention should be. PHC discussions in the past two years have focused on education available to the public on antimicrobials with a focus on schools and childcare facilities; Illegal pesticides found on the shelf during marketplace inspections and how we can educate the public; and educating store managers on how to read the label and identify any discrepancies that could point to a possibility that the product is not registered for use. There was also discussion that the PHC should determine which issues are of the most concern for SLA/Territories/Tribes and simplify our agenda so we can be more effective. Others also questioned whether the Committee should shift to addressing immediate structural pest control issues.

The meeting ended with Mary sharing 2 You-tube videos and a link to web site regarding Climate Change and vector borne disease
