Chapter 141: ORDINANCES

§3001. Ordinance power

Any municipality, by the adoption, amendment or repeal of ordinances or bylaws, may exercise any power or function which the Legislature has power to confer upon it, which is not denied either expressly or by clear implication, and exercise any power or function granted to the municipality by the Constitution of Maine, general law or charter. [PL 1987, c. 737, Pt. A, S2 (NEW); PL 1987, c. 737, Pt. C, S106 (NEW); PL 1989, c. 6 (AMD); PL 1989, c. 9, S2 (AMD); PL 1989, c. 104, Pt. C, SS8, 10 (AMD).]

Liberal construction. This section, being necessary for the welfare of the municipalities and their inhabitants, shall be liberally construed to effect its purposes.

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2. Presumption of authority. There is a rebuttable presumption that any ordinance enacted under this section is a valid exercise of a municipality's home rule authority.

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3. Standard of preemption. The Legislature shall not be held to have implicitly denied any power granted to municipalities under this section unless the municipal ordinance in question would frustrate the purpose of any state law.

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4. Penalties accrue to municipality. All penalties established by ordinance shall be recovered on complaint to the use of the municipality.

Chapter 258-A: BOARD OF PESTICIDES CONTROL

§1471-U. Municipal ordinances

1. Centralized listing. The Board of Pesticides Control shall maintain for informational purposes, for the entire State, a centralized listing of municipal ordinances that specifically apply to pesticide storage, distribution or use.

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2. Existing ordinances. The clerk of any municipality which, on the effective date of this section, has an ordinance to be listed under subsection 1 shall file a copy of that ordinance with the board by December 31, 1988.

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3. New ordinances. The clerk of the municipality shall provide the board with notice and a copy of any ordinance to be listed under subsection 1 at least 7 days prior to the meeting of the legislative body or the public hearing at which adoption of the ordinance will be considered. The clerk shall notify the board within 30 days after adoption of the ordinance.

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4. Intent. It is the intent of this section to provide information on municipal ordinances. This section shall not affect municipal authority to enact ordinances.

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5. Failure to file. For any ordinance which is not filed with the board, with notice given to the board in accordance with this section, which is otherwise valid under the laws of this State, any provision that specifically applies to storage, distribution or use of pesticides shall be considered void and of no effect after the deadline for filing and until the board is given proper notice and the ordinance is filed with the board.

Municipal Pesticide Ordinances

A number of Maine towns have adopted local ordinances to control pesticide use. If other municipalities want to consider their own ordinances they must follow the guidelines established by the Legislature found in <u>22 MRSA Section 1471-U</u>. Below is a list of the municipal ordinances that have been filed with the BPC. A scanned version of the ordinance is available as a PDF.

PURPOSE OF ORDINANCE

Sec. 34-2. Purpose.

The purpose of this ordinance is to safeguard the health, safety and welfare of the residents of the City and to conserve and protect the City's waterways and natural resources by curtailing the use of pesticides for turf, landscape and outdoor pest management.

WHAT DOES THE ORDINANCE ALLOW AND PROHIBIT?

Sec. 32-5. Applicability of Ordinance.

(A) Allowed and prohibited pesticides.

Subject to the applicability dates set forth in Sec. 32-14 herein, for turf, landscape and outdoor pest management activities in the City, the following shall apply:

- (i) Synthetic substances are prohibited unless specifically listed as "allowed" on the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National List of Allowed and Prohibited Substances (the "National List");
- (ii) Non-synthetic substances are allowed unless specifically listed as "prohibited" on the National List;
- (iii) Pesticides determined to be "minimum risk pesticides" pursuant to the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and Rodenticide Act (FIFRA) and listed in 40 C.F.R. § 152.25(f)(1) or (2), as may be amended from time to time, are allowed; and
- (iv) The use or application of pesticides (whether natural, organic, "nonsynthetic," synthetic or otherwise) within 75 feet of a water body or wetland is prohibited.

WHAT IS THE "NATIONAL LIST"?

7 CFR PART 205 SUBPART G § 205.601 SYNTHETIC SUBSTANCES ALLOWED FOR USE IN ORGANIC CROP PRODUCTION.

EXAMPLES:

AS INSECTICIDES (INCLUDING ACARICIDES OR MITE CONTROL).

- (1) AMMONIUM CARBONATE—FOR USE AS BAIT IN INSECT TRAPS ONLY, NO DIRECT CONTACT WITH CROP OR SOIL.
- (2) AQUEOUS POTASSIUM SILICATE (CAS #-1312-76-1)—THE SILICA, USED IN THE MANUFACTURE OF POTASSIUM SILICATE, MUST BE SOURCED FROM NATURALLY OCCURRING SAND.
- (3) BORIC ACID—STRUCTURAL PEST CONTROL, NO DIRECT CONTACT WITH ORGANIC FOOD OR CROPS.
- (4) COPPER SULFATE—FOR USE AS TADPOLE SHRIMP CONTROL IN AQUATIC RICE PRODUCTION, IS LIMITED TO ONE APPLICATION PER FIELD DURING ANY 24-MONTH PERIOD.
- (5) ELEMENTAL SULFUR.
- (6) LIME SULFUR—INCLUDING CALCIUM POLYSULFIDE.
- (7) OILS, HORTICULTURAL—NARROW RANGE OILS AS DORMANT, SUFFOCATING, AND SUMMER OILS.
- (8) SOAPS, INSECTICIDAL.
- (9) STICKY TRAPS/BARRIERS.

EXEMPTIONS

- (B) Exempt pesticides.
 - (i) The following activities or materials are exempt from the provisions of this ordinance (and so are allowed):
 - (a) Commercial agriculture;
 - (b) Pet supplies, such as shampoos and tick and flea treatments, when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer;
 - (c) Disinfectants, germicides, bactericides, miticides and virucides, when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer;
 - (d) Insect repellents when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer;
 - (e) Rat and rodent control supplies when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer;
 - (f) Swimming pool supplies when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer; and
 - (g) General use paints, stains and wood preservatives and sealants when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer.

EXEMPTIONS CONTINUED

- (ii) The following applications are exempt from the provisions of this ordinance (and so are allowed):
 - (a) Specific health and safety application Prohibited pesticides may be used to control plants that are poisonous to the touch, such as poison ivy; pests of significant health importance such as ticks and mosquitoes; and animals or insects that may cause damage to a structure, such as carpenter ants or termites;
 - (b) Golf course playing surfaces application Prohibited pesticides may be used on non-City owned golf course playing surfaces and on the tees and greens of City-owned golf courses provided that the course is designated through Audubon International as a Certified Audubon Cooperative Sanctuary;
 - (c) Invasive insect application Prohibited pesticides may be used to control the Emerald Ash Borer, Asian Longhorned Beetle, Hemlock Woolly Adelgid, Browntail Moth and other insects identified as invasive by the Maine Forest Service; and
 - (d) Right-of-way spraying Prohibited pesticides may be used by a public utility that maintains a right-of-way through the City.

SYNTHETIC VS. NON-SYNTHETIC

Natural, organic or "non-synthetic." A substance that is derived from mineral, plant, or animal matter and does not undergo a "synthetic" process as defined in the Organic Foods Production Act, 7 U.S.C. § 6502(21), as the same may be amended from time to time.

<u>Synthetic.</u> A substance that is formulated or manufactured by a chemical process or by a process that chemically changes a substance extracted from naturally occurring sources, except that such term shall not apply to substances created by naturally occurring biological processes.

PERMITTED AND PROHIBITED ORDINANCE ACTIVITIES

(a) Permitted:

- 1102.1 Use or application of natural, organic land care protocols.
- All control products and soil amendments, including fertilizer and compost, used under the terms of this article shall be in keeping with, but not limited to, products that can be used on Maine Organic Farmers and Gardeners Association Certified Farms, and/or products permitted by the Organic Materials Review Institute or the USDA National Organic Program.
- Use or application of sludge or sludge-derived products to the extent permitted by the Maine Hazardous Waste, Septage and Solid Waste Management Act 38 M.R.S.A. §§1301-1319-Y, the Protection of Natural Resources Act 38 M.R.S.A. §§ 480-A-480-Z, the Site Location of Development Act 38 M.R.S.A.§ 481-490, and any rules related thereto, as amended from time to time.

(b) Prohibited:

Use or application of chemical pesticides, other than pesticides classified by the US Environmental Protection Agency as exempt materials under 40 CFR 152.25, and those products permitted by the Organic Materials Review Institute.

EXEMPTIONS: MITICIDES OMITTED

(B) Exempt pesticides.

- (i) The following activities or materials are exempt from the provisions of this ordinance (and so are allowed):
 - (a) Commercial agriculture;
 - (b) Pet supplies, such as shampoos and tick and flea treatments, when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer;
 - (c) Disinfectants, germicides, bactericides, miticides and virucides, when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer;
 - (d) Insect repellents when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer;
 - (e) Rat and rodent control supplies when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer;
 - (f) Swimming pool supplies when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer; and
 - (g) General use paints, stains and wood preservatives and sealants when used in the manner specified by the manufacturer.

REPORTING REPETITION

Sec. 32-8. Reporting by State of Maine Licensed Applicators.

In addition to complying with the Maine Board of Pesticides Control rules regarding record keeping and reporting requirements outlined in Chapter 50 of the Code of Maine Rules, all State of Maine licensed applicators are required to submit to the City Clerk an annual summary report on or before February 1 relating to the preceding calendar year. The report shall contain the following information for applications performed in the City in the prior calendar year: target site, pesticide brand name, EPA registration number, total undiluted formulation (in pounds or gallons), and total area treated as listed and as amended on the Commercial Applicator Annual Summary Report required by the Maine Board of Pesticides Control.

ENFORCEMENT RESPONSIBILITY

Sec. 32-11. Enforcement.

It shall be the duty of the Code Enforcement Officer to provide investigative assistance and to enforce the provisions of this ordinance in collaboration with the City's Sustainability Coordinator. The Sustainability Coordinator shall work with alleged violators of this ordinance to bring them into compliance by providing the individual(s) with educational materials and advice on the use of less toxic chemicals to achieve their desired results. The Sustainability Coordinator will maintain a listing of complaints of alleged violations of this ordinance and how they were resolved. The listing will include the nature of the complaint, a summary of the situation and a brief description of how each complaint was resolved. This information will be reported on the City's website in aggregate by Assessor's tax map number and not by specific property address or Assessor's lot number.

Prohibited Pest Management Activities and/or Materials:

- Application, storage, or sale of Synthetic substances other than those specifically listed as "allowed" in the U.S. Department of Agriculture's National List of Allowed and Prohibited Substances, (National Organic Program) <u>CFR Title 7 205.602</u>, with aforementioned exemptions in Permitted (3.) above and Exemptions (E.) below.
- 2. Other Prohibited Pesticides include:
 - a. Any Pesticide classified as "Carcinogenic to Humans" or "Likely to be Carcinogenic to Humans" by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency.
 - b. Any Pesticide classified by the U.S. Environmental Protection Agency as a <u>"Restricted</u> Use Product."
 - c. Any Pesticide classified as a <u>"Class 9"</u> pesticide by the Ontario, Canada, Ministry of the Environment.
 - d. Any Pesticide classified as a "Category 1 Endocrine Disruptor" by the European Commission.
